Opening Keynote: Al Carlozzi, EdD, LMFT Licensed Health Service Psychologist Professor Emeritus, Oklahoma State University

About the Speaker

Dr. Al Carlozzi is a licensed health service psychologist, licensed marital and family therapist, and professor emeritus at Oklahoma State University (OSU). He retired from OSU in 2019, after serving 40 years on the OSU faculty. He has held several administrative positions at OSU in Stillwater, including Head of the School of Applied Health and Educational Psychology and Associate Dean/Interim Dean of the Graduate College, and for his last 13 years with OSU, he

served as Professor and Director of the OSU-Tulsa Counseling Center, which was renamed the Al Carlozzi Center for Counseling at OSU-Tulsa in 2020. Awards he received include the OSU Regents Distinguished Teaching Award, OSU-Tulsa Outstanding Teaching Award, Distinguished Researcher Award, and Leadership and Service Excellence Award.

For more than a decade, Dr. Carlozzi served on committees for Mental Health Association Oklahoma and as co-leader of a support group for parents of transgender youth at the Dennis R. Neill Equality Center. He maintained a part-time private psychology practice for 34 years. Dr. Carlozzi has conducted numerous presentations on ethical issues in mental health practice and on gender affirming treatment for transgender and gender expansive persons. He is co-editor of the book, Transgender and Gender Diverse Persons: A Handbook for Service Providers, Educators, and Families, published by Routledge in 2019. At the request of the interim dean of student services at the University of Tulsa, he served as interim director of Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) and participated in the search for a permanent director throughout the fall semester of 2021. While he retired as an OSU professor in 2019 and as a private practitioner in 2022, he continues to serve on various committees, such as the Zarrow Mental Health Symposium Planning Committee and the Compassionate Tulsa Committee, and to conduct presentations for community and professional groups.

Breakout Session 1 10:30 AM-11:45 AM

Option 1- Trauma Informed Care with College Students (may schedule till full). Kara Niccum, M.S., LMFT, LADC, Oklahoma State University Student Union French Lounge 270

This presentation will address how trauma plays out in the lives of college students behaviorally, emotionally, and academically. The impact of trauma on the developing brain, what it means to be a trauma informed clinician, and what trauma informed care looks like in clinical practice will be addressed. The presenter is a certified EMDR therapist, approved consultant, and trainer, therefore trauma informed care as a foundation for EMDR therapy will be woven throughout.

Option 2- Bridging the Gap for Survivors through Yoga (may schedule till full). Mary Ellen Solon, M.S.W., LCSW, RYT-200, University of Tulsa Student Union Sequoyah Room 280

Survivors of sexual assault often want individual counseling and peer support groups but may feel too overwhelmed to engage with these services. Trauma-Informed Yoga offers an accessible and embodied alternative that also serves to create a community of healing.

Option 1- Existential Dialectics of Care: A Model for Being Grounded in Value (may schedule till full).

Understanding how values, such as care and empathy, impact the therapeutic process are import considerations for the clinician. This presentation will review theoretical and philosophical perspectives within Existential Psychotherapy and the phenomenology of empathy by Edith Stein. Thus applying a more accurate perspective and therapeutic approach to empathy.

Option 2- Physical and Mental Health in a University Counseling Center (may schedule till full).

Option 1- Navigating Support with Community Partners: Addressing Mental Health Concerns and Crises (may schedule till full).

It is common for non-mental health professionals to be the first point of contact for a student crisis. Often these professionals are limited in their ability to navigate these challenges while safeguarding their own well-being. This talk will focus on how to provide support for non-mental health partners on setting boundaries, providing referrals, and increasing their capacity to meeting these challenges.

Option 2- College Mental Health Education and Suicide Prevention Outside the Clinical Perspective (may schedule till full).

This presentation would provide insight into the current prevention education for students regarding mental health and suicide within the college student population. The presenter highlights what Oklahoma State University and Department of Wellness are doing in terms of mental health from a health education and promotion standpoint. The presentation will demonstrate the ongoing effort to emphasize the correlation of physical and mental health through nonclinical means.
